The treaties did not deal with surrender of lands and resources but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.

1. What country did you come from?

Me and my husband came from the Philippines

2. What was the hardest thing about moving here?

Financially, as the principal applicant, I need to borrow money to support my coming to Canada for my airfare, accommodation, food and clothing allowances, and visa payments Communication Barrier. Although we know how to speak English, we don't use it often in my country unless we are in school or in the workplace, where we are required to communicate in English.

There are so many things to do for a newcomer, like opening a bank account, getting my SIN, government ID, health ard ID, getting a family doctor, and looking for more resources for help with future information.

3. How do you feel now that you are a Canadian Citizen?

I felt so happy the day I received my Permanent Residency. And now that I am a Canadian Citizen, I feel mixed emotions. My dream and my mother's wishes came true at last. I'm so happy because all my sacrifices are worth it, fruits of labor.Lonely because my mother, who so much prayed to God and wished me to be successful here in Canada, passed away before I came in the year 2018. I want to share this news with her wherever she is right now. And I know that she is happy and still watching over us. She is my inspiration and my family in pursuing this dream.

4. What is your favorite thing about living in Canada?

I say my favorite feeling is the FEELING of WELCOMENESS of all the Canadian people, most of all the people here in Miramichi, NB, where I've been residing for almost 6 years now. Everybody is welcoming, friendly, and kind to all newcomers.

5. Did the multicultural association help? How?

The MRMA caters services to newcomers like me. They are very accommodating and ready to help and give informations that you need. Specially to mention Juliette Cabana who helped us.

6. A piece of advice you have for new people in Canada?

Prepare financially, prepare to adjust your nature of work no matter what is your position before in other countries, get to know Canada, keep in touch with your heritage and share as well, never stop learning and being kind to all kinds of people, give inspiration to people by being simple and happy person, and most of all be proud of what race you are and thank Canadian Government for giving the opportunities for the work I have and becoming a Canadian Citizen
