Welcome to New Brunswick

New Brunswick's population is approximately 750,000, including over 28,000 immigrants. It is the only province in Canada that has two official languages – English and French. The province is divided into 15 counties, with Northumberland County being the largest and home to Miramichi. Miramichi and its neighboring towns, such as Baie Ste Anne, Neguac, Rogersville, Doaktown, and Blackville, have a diverse population. Additionally, about 33% of New Brunswick's population speaks French as their primary language.





Welcome to the Miramichi Region

The Greater Miramichi region covers most of Northumberland County, except for Upper Miramichi, Doaktown, and Blissfield Parish. It includes several communities, such as Miramichi City, Blackville, Neguac, and the Mi'kmaq First Nation communities of Eel Ground, Metepenagiag, and Esgenoôpetitj. The region's cultural identity is tied to various heritages, including Mi'kmaq, Acadian, English, Scottish, and Irish. The region has also become home to diverse immigrant communities from the Philippines, Africa, the Caribbean, India, and Southeast Asia.



Medicare Card

To receive health care in New Brunswick, you must have a health card, called a "Medicare" card; otherwise you will have to pay for the services.



Driver's Licence

You need a driver's license to operate a motor vehicle in Canada. Cost varies.



Social Insurance Number

In order for anyone to work in Canada they must have a Social Insurance Number (SIN). Each person has their own number that is also required to receive any government benefits (ie Medicare card); and open a bank account. Your SIN is provided free of charge.

The official currency of Canada is the Canadian dollar (\$). One dollar is worth 100 cents (¢). Coin money has six different values. Each has a distinct color, format, and an image representing Canada on its face.

There are many financial institutions in the Miramichi Region that can help with all your banking and financial needs.



Bank Accounts

You should open a bank account as soon as possible. There are two types of accounts; chequing and savings. In order to open an account, you need a social insurance number (optional), and a photo ID (passport or driver's license). You may speak with a bank representative about the kind of account you want.



Credit Card

You can also get a credit card at your bank. A credit card allows cardholders to borrow funds to pay for goods and services with merchants that accept cards for payment. Credit cards impose the condition that cardholders pay back the borrowed money, plus any applicable interest, in full by the billing date. The interest on credit cards is very high so be careful how you use your credit card. In order to get a credit card, you will need to provide your bank with personal information.



Credit Check

Your credit report is a summary of your credit history. Your credit report is created when you borrow money or apply for credit for the first time. Lenders send information about your accounts to the credit bureaus, also known as credit reporting agencies.

There are two main credit bureaus in Canada: Equifax and TransUnion.

These are private companies that collect, store and share information about how you use credit. These companies only collect information from creditors about your financial experiences in Canada.



Canada Post

Canada Post delivers your mail at home and ships letters and parcels. In new neighborhoods, the mail may be delivered to community mailboxes along the street.





Other outlets can be found at pharmacies and grocery stores. In addition to selling stamps and shipping packages, they have passport applications and income tax return documents.

When mailing a letter or package, it must contain:

- Correct postage
- A return address (your home or work) The address where you are sending it

*The addresses must also contain postal codes



Each year there are official days whereupon government offices and many businesses are closed for business. Most of these holidays occur across Canada as well.

New Brunswick experiences a variety of weather patterns, which are typical of coastal regions and forested areas. The presence of moist air from the Atlantic Ocean results in mild winters and moderate summer temperatures.

The clothing worn in New-Brunswick depends on the season. Light weight clothing is worn in the summer, such as shorts, tshirts and sandals.

In the spring and fall you will need a light jacket to go outdoors.

Winter brings cold weather and snow, so warm clothing is necessary, such as: winter coat, mittens or gloves, hat, scarf, winter boots, and ski pants. Layering clothes is important in the winter because it helps to trap warm air between the layers, providing better insulation for the body. Additionally, layering allows for better regulation of body heat, as one can remove or add layers depending on the activity level and external temperature.

In the Miramichi region, many stores offer new clothing, but certain stores specialize in used clothing (see page 51, **Second Hand Stores**).

During winter, people of the Miramichi enjoy outdoor sports and activities such as skiing, skating, and sliding. To enjoy these activities, attention to appropriate clothing is necessary.

Before you start looking for work, it is a good idea to think about your career goals. Keep in mind that you may not be able to find an ideal job right away, but do not get discouraged. If you are not happy with the job you get, you can always continue to look for better opportunities.

As a new arrival in Canada, you may want to accept a job that is available, even if it is not perfect, as it is important to acquire Canadian work experience. Remember: the first job you get is only a starting point. It has been found that it is easier to find work when you are working. You will be able to get better work as you learn more English and/or French and get more Canadian work experience.

The MRMA has access to employment counsellors to help you with your career planning and acquiring Canadian job search skills.

Qualifications Recognition

It is important to be able to use the education, training, and work experience you acquired in your country of origin. There are several documents related to your education and experiences that can help Canadian employers understand your international qualifications.

The types of documents that may be required include:

- Degrees, diplomas or certificates from universities, colleges, secondary schools or trade school
- Apprenticeship certificates
- · Letters from employers
- Work descriptions for jobs you have done
- Letters of reference

New Brunswick's minimum wage as of April 1, 2023 is \$15.30 per hour. All employees paid by salary, commission and for piece work must receive at least minimum wage for every hour worked. Starting your own business

The Miramichi Region has a wide array of business services, facilities and infrastructure that make it an ideal destination for business investors and international newcomers.

Municipalities in the region (Blackville, Doaktown, Miramichi, Neguac and Rogersville) each provide confidential and free advisory services to prospective business persons.

Some international newcomers may be interested in buying or partnering in an existing business. To buy an existing business or a new business site, licensed real estate brokers/sales associates ("realtors") are available to assist you. Finding Temporary Housing in the Region

Should you need temporary housing during your first few weeks in the region while you search for permanent housing, perform a web search or consult the Yellow Pages under: Motels, Hotels & Inns.

Renting an Apartment or House

Renting an apartment or a house is an affordable option, and is perhaps a better choice when you first arrive in Canada. Also, renting does not take as long to move in and get settled as buying a house. To find a place to rent, check:

- Signs on apartments or homes

Become familiar with your rights and responsibilities if you rent.

Signing a Lease

A lease is a rental contract between landlord and tenant. In New Brunswick, the landlord and tenant must sign a prescribed form of lease, called the Standard Form of Lease. The lease sets out the rights and responsibilities of both the landlord and tenant. Even if the landlord and tenant did not sign a lease, the Residential Tenancies Act still regulates the relationship. A lease of determined length is automatically over at the end of the specified period. However, a tenant or landlord may end a limited lease earlier by giving written notice. The time frame permitted to cancel such lease varies according to the type of lease. For more information, visit: www.gnb.ca/renting



Medicare

In Canada, health care is paid for in part with taxes. To obtain healthcare in New Brunswick, you need a Medicare card. The Medicare card permits you to get most healthcare services for free. When you arrive in NB, it is very important to request this card as soon as possible.

You can get an Application for Registration – Medicare at a Service New Brunswick (SNB) office or by phoning: **1-888-762-8600**. You must use a separate form for each person over the age of 19. To make your request, you will need to provide documentation. To see the types of documentation required, go to **www.snb.ca**.

Applications are assessed on an individual basis and other documents may be requested to verify eligibility. If you have moved to New Brunswick, you may be eligible for New Brunswick Medicare coverage on the first day of the third month following the month you have established permanent residence in New Brunswick.

Eligibility

To be eligible for New Brunswick Medicare coverage you must be: A Canadian citizen or be legally entitled to remain in Canada; A resident who makes their permanent and principal home in New Brunswick

Your Medicare card is for you only. Each member of your family needs his-her own card. You cannot exchange your card, nor let another person use your card or you risk: losing your Medicare coverage, facing criminal charges, and/or being asked to leave Canada.

Finding a Family Doctor

To get a family doctor, you will be placed on a waiting list. (Ask at the Hospital or Medical Clinic for names & numbers of doctors, or consult the Yellow Pages). While you are on the waiting list, you can get medical services at a walk-in clinic or at the hospital.



Tele-health is a bilingual telephone assistance service offered by the Health Minister of NB. Experienced nurses answer your calls 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The service offers translation in over 100 languages.

In New Brunswick, public schools are offered in English and French. There are five levels in the educational system:

- Elementary: kindergarten to grade 5
- Middle School: grades 6 to 8
- High School: grades 9 to 12
- Community College
- University

Canadian law requires that children aged 6 to 16 attend school, and public schools are free for all residents.

In the Miramichi region there are many public schools, and your child should attend the school closest to your home. The English schools in the Miramichi Region are managed by Anglophone North School District (see: http://asd-n.nbed. nb.ca or phone (506) 778-6075) while the French schools are managed by the Francophone District (http:// francophonesud.nbed.nb.ca/ or phone (506) 856-3333)

Registering your Child in School

To register your child in school, make an appointment with the school district office for the school you have chosen. When you go to your appointment, bring the required documents, such as: immigration documents, passports, vaccination certificates, and school record of the child. If you are not sure which school your child should attend, contact the desired school district office.

Heating

Winter in New Brunswick can be very cold. Starting in autumn, you must heat your home. Buildings can be heated many ways: electricity, heating oil, or a wood or pellet stove.

Apartment

Ask whether the cost of heating is included in the rent.

House

Find out which type of heating is used before buying a house.

Electricity

In Canada, the electrical supply is 110 Volts and 60 Hertz (cycles per second). NB Power is the company which will provide your home with electricity.

Heating with Oil

You may perform a web search or consult the Yellow Pages listing for Oils-Fuel for companies who sell this in the Miramichi area.

Gas

Natural gas is not available in the Miramichi Region. Propane gas is available in tanks/cylinders and is used for cooking and hot water heating. You may perform a web search or consult the Yellow Pages listing for propane providers in the region.







Driver's Licence

Any person wishing to operate a motor vehicle in NB must have a Driver's Licence. The law requires you to carry this licence with you each time you drive. Even if you do not plan to drive a motor vehicle, it is good to have a driver's licence as an identification document (ID). Many jobs require a driver's licence.

You may use your international driver's licence or foreign licence for up to three months after you arrive. If you already have a driver's licence, visit Service New Brunswick to either exchange for a New Brunswick one, or if required, be tested for a new one. Service New Brunswick has forms, brochures, information and services for new drivers.

From Other Countries

Non-residents from other countries must take a full driver's licence examination which includes a road test, vision test, and written examination. Exceptions are those from the following countries who may exchange their licence from country of origin for a Class 5 (including a motorcycle endorsement without testing, if applicable) or a class 6 or 6D.

Documentation

A non-resident from any foreign country must provide the following documentation:

- Their original driver's licence
- An English translation of the driver's licence (from a translation agency or an International Driver's Licence)
- Original passport



Vehicle Registration

To drive a motor vehicle on NB roads, your vehicle must be registered. The price of registration varies. You can access Vehicle Registration Services at SNB Centers, or by phoning: 1 (888) 762-8600.

Insurance

Every vehicle driven on NB roads must be insured. In order to get auto insurance, you must contact an insurance agent. Consult your Yellow-Pages listings under: Insurance-Agents and Brokers, or perform a web search for names and numbers. Not all insurance agents have experience with newcomers or recognize foreign driving experience.

If you can provide a 'no claims letter' from your foreign insurance agent, you may get a better premium.

Vehicle Inspection

All motor vehicles and registered towing (trailers) must be verified once a year by an authorized mechanic. (Taxis and buses are inspected twice a year.) This inspection must conform to the Motor Vehicle Inspections Act. You must also keep the inspection report in your vehicle.

Consult your Yellow-Pages or website listings under: Automobile Inspection Stations to find a mechanic.
